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# Kansas Librarians Appointed to Census Complete Count Committee

Eric Norris, Kansas State Librarian, and Robin Newell, Executive Director of the Emporia Public Library and incoming president of the Kansas Library Association, were recently appointed by Governor Laura Kelly to the Kansas Complete Count Committee created through Executive Order #19-07. The committee's duty is to coordinate efforts to promote and advertise the 2020 Census. Committee members will coordinate responses to questions about the Census, provide available resources on hard-to-count populations, and help ensure the highest participation rate possible.

"It is a priority that my administration provides the Kansas Complete Count Committee the tools they need to ensure an accurate count," Kelly said. "Every voice is important and every Kansan must be counted. In addition to the amount of federal funding that is on the line, we need an accurate picture of our communities so that we can properly plan for the future. These individuals are highly passionate professionals willing to step up to the challenge."

Both Norris and Newell expect public libraries to play an important role during the 2020 census year including access to technology, meeting and training spaces, and providing trustworthy information to community members across the state. The goal for the 2020 Census is to ensure that everyone is counted once, only once and in the right place.

The garden includes a set of five tuned drums, Pagoda bells, the Serenade (xylophone), Rhythm (which has a Caribbean sound), and two metal flowers, each with different notes.

Just before July 4, 2018 the instruments were all packed and ready to ship to Kansas. Over that holiday weekend a fire destroyed a major part of the factory where the instruments were made and stored. All of the instruments had to be remade and did not arrive until late fall. It was far too late in the season to begin work on this outdoor project. The instruments spent the winter in the city shop. The spring rain spoiled many plans; finally, the week of June 17 the rain let up enough that the city crew could get to work.

The Music Garden is for the whole community. Our hope is that it will provide enjoyment and spark creativity for years to come. The garden is dedicated to the child in all of us.

# Census 2020—Are You Prepared?

As a trusted source of reliable information in your community, and the 2020 Census less than a year away – Are you prepared?

The American Library Association and the Georgetown Center on Poverty and Inequality (GCPI) have partnered to produce the *Libraries' Guide to the 2020 Census* in an effort to give you a general overview of the who, what, where, when, and why concerning the census, and help better prepare you for the work ahead.

The <u>Libraries' Guide to the 2020 Census</u> is available for free download at <u>ala.org/census</u>. The Guide contains practical information to assist library staff in addressing potential patron and community requests regarding the upcoming 2020 Census. The *Guide* includes:

basic information about the census process;

highlights of new components in the 2020 Census, such as the online response option; frequently asked questions;

a timeline of key census dates;

contact information and links to additional resources.

Beginning on page 9, the *Guide* outlines specific areas of preparation for librarians and library staff to help ensure a successful count in each community, with suggestions such as the following.

Participate in Complete Count Committees.

Prepare for increased use of library computers and internet service.

Help community members apply for census jobs.

Fight misinformation, disinformation, and scams.

Provide information about census participation.

Help reach Hard-to-Count populations.

The *Guide* also includes information concerning the possibility of a citizenship question, and other changes new to this census, as well as links to more information about <u>Counting Rural America</u> and <u>Counting People Experiencing Homelessness</u>. This will be the first year the Census Bureau is asking people to respond online and, as you already know, there are people in your community who do not have access to reliable internet service and your connection to that population is critical for an accurate count.

The census is a tool the helps inform a wide range of decisions concerning where federal money is expended, identifying public facility and transportation needs, and the governmental representation of your community, to name just a few. These are big decisions that are formed around demographics and information that is only collected once every ten years; it is important that your community is counted accurately and you can help. Census Day is April 1, 2020 – Be informed and be ready!

# Kansas Librarian Presents to Iranian National Library

When a Kansas regional library director received an e-mail invitation for a meeting in Tehran, Iran, he did what every good librarian does. He started gathering more information.

The invitation came from Saleh Zamani, editor of *iBulletin*, a publication of the National Library and Archives of the Islamic Republic of Iran. Zamani read an online article that Paul Hawkins, director of the South Central Kansas Library System (SCKLS), South Hutchinson, Kan., had written about the future of libraries. The online article "Change in Libraries: Directions for the Future" was published March 28, 2019 in *Public Library Quarterly*, a journal with national and international readership.

"With the differences in language, I wasn't sure the presentation was actually going to happen until we tested Skype and saw the formal conference table at the National Library and Archives in Tehran," said Hawkins.

The Iranian host for the web conference also requested Hawkins pause his English language presentation every five minutes to allow for translation and reading in Farsi, the Iranian national language. Hawkins chose to title his July 23 presentation "The Future of Public Libraries and Tethering the Camel."

"'Trust in God but tie your camel' is an Islamic proverb that I related to library planning," Hawkins explained. "In our culture we might understand it as 'God helps those who help themselves.'" Hawkins also described information from a SCKLS study that identified two general trends of change in south central area public libraries.

"I talked about repurposing of existing physical space and the growth of the virtual library and used the new Wichita Advanced Learning Library as well as the smaller public library in Cunningham, Kan., as examples," Hawkins said. "I've worked with Kansas librarians for three decades but never expected to speak to librarians in Iran. They want to continue consultations," said Hawkins. "Given the conflict between our nations, I'm grateful we have libraries in common."

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

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# Foundations Fund Purchase of Hays Public Library Bookmobile

A bookmobile is coming to Hays! With funding from the Dane G. Hansen Foundation and the Hays Public Library Foundation, the Hays Public Library is purchasing a bookmobile to expand outreach services. The bookmobile will allow the library to move beyond the building to provide books and other resources at locations throughout the community. A Dane G. Hansen grant of \$76,200 and a matching contribution from the Hays Public Library Foundation will pay for the \$152,400 bookmobile.

The bookmobile, which is expected to be delivered early next year, will be equipped to provide a variety of library services. Making regular stops at popular locations around the community, patrons will be able to get a library card, browse the collection, and request alternative items for future stops. The bookmobile also will be a wi-fi hotspot for patrons who need access to the internet. Visits to senior living facilities and early childhood centers will be standard practice for the bookmobile.

"The Hays Public Library is so much more than a nice big building on Main Street full of books and computers," said Hays Public Library Director Brandon Hines. "We know that to provide the level of excellence of service we strive for and to provide an optimal return of value to our community, we must get outside the walls of the library. We are already doing this in a number of ways. The acquisition of a bookmobile will greatly enhance our ability to be embedded throughout the various sectors of our community and provide services to those who can't or don't regularly come through the doors of the library."

Adding a bookmobile to the library's services has been a goal of Outreach Coordinator Vera Elwood, who conducted much of the research into vehicle specifications and funding opportunities. Unfortunately, Elwood is leaving the library later this month for a new position closer to her family, and so the library is currently advertising for a new Outreach Coordinator to oversee this project and outreach services.

The Hays Public Library Foundation is a volunteer group that helps address emergent and unexpected needs of the library through supplemental investments and funding, such as assisting with the purchase of the bookmobile. The Hays Public Library Foundation was established in 2001. For more information or to get involved, visit the library website. The Dane G. Hansen Foundation was established as a charitable organization in 1965, with the primary goal of making the communities of Northwest Kansas better places to live. Established through a generous estate donation from Dane G. Hansen, the Foundation awards grants and scholarships every year to qualified recipients in Northwest Kansas who demonstrate a strong desire for community improvement.

"We can't wait to deploy this incredible tool," Hines continued, "and are immensely thankful to the Dane G. Hansen Foundation and Hays Public Library Foundation for making this possible."
