The National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) selected the Wichita Public Library as a recipient of a \$15,000 grant for the NEA Big Read: Wichita. This year, the community is encouraged to read *Lab Girl* by Hope Jahren. The program runs through November 15.

Lab Girl is a memoir about Jahren's life as a geobiologist living with bipolar disorder, and how she finds beauty in nature and science. "

"We chose *Lab Girl* because of the community organizations we can partner with," said Julie Sherwood, Partnership and Community Engagement Manager for the Wichita Public Library. "The book talks about the beauty of science and nature, and we look forward to building upon these themes through science, arts and cultural programs all across the city."


Take notes for future reference

Did you know a Twitter thread is a great method of notetaking? A thread is a series of Tweets connected by replies to subsequent Tweets. Since you're limited to 280 characters, it helps you keep notes concise, and you can easily refer back by linking to the original Tweet in the thread.
